I. Title: EDU 698 Thesis

II. Catalog Description:

Designed to enable students to choose a thesis topic with the consent of the student's thesis faculty director, implement the topic research design and produce a master's degree thesis suitable for publication.

III. Purpose:

The purpose of this course is to provide the student with the opportunity to engage in research under the direct supervision of graduate education faculty.

The following objectives, address Standard 1 of the Kentucky Experienced Teacher Standards. As a result of participation in this course, students will:

1. select a research problem
2. review the literature
3. evaluate the research literature
4. select appropriate instrumentation and research design
5. administer the instrumentation
6. conduct the study
7. process the research data
 - a. Prepare a research proposal
 - b. Designing the research treatment plan
 - c. Pre testing or gathering data
 - d. Implementing treatment plan
 - e. Collection past data
 - f. Analysis and writing of final findings
